
"It doesn't look like there is going to be rain," he muttered to himself and got up.

He saw a large tree. Its shade was cool and inviting.



The past tense is used to show actions which happened in the past.

These actions are over. We usually add-d or -ed to the verb to form the Past Tense.

For example: played - play + ed, worked = work + ed

Some words have irregular past tense forms.

For example: brought = buy - bought,, taught = teach - taught.

- They were playing when a monkey came there. (were + play + -ing)
