
The Magic of Labour

This gave the zamindar another idea. "I will give you thrice the amount of land somewhere else in the village. In place of the two acres that you have, I will give you six acres."



Raj Pal was very rude. "I don't know and don't care what






you will do with it. We had reached an agreement today and I hope you are man enough to abide by it."

"I will show him some of my own magic!" shouted Raj Pal, as he walked into Birju's hut.


"You could have called me," said Birju, when he saw the zamindar.
